CMFkids Launches!

We are excited to announce the first round of awards from Crotched Mountain's exciting new CMF Kids program, totaling \$200,000 in support of special education initiatives in six New Hampshire public school districts.

Through CMF Kids, Crotched Mountain and you, our donors, are reaching nearly 700 children with complex disabilities. The six districts represent some of the most economically disadvantaged in the state with an average of 50% of students coming from lower-income families. In addition, CMF Kids will support dozens of special and general educators as well as paraprofessional staff.

Investments ranged between \$5,300 and \$50,000

and support a variety of initiatives including vocational training, increased community access through transportation, professional teacher development, a paraprofessional training program, and a district-wide comprehensive needs assessment.

"As we have for nearly 100 years, Crotched Mountain Foundation is committed to supporting children with disabilities and to help them achieve a life of independence," said Ned Olney, President and CEO of Crotched Mountain Foundation. "CMF Kids partners with schools to improve educational outcomes for students with complex disabilities."



Life to its Fullest

Terry Ann is looking forward to this Christmas. She's cautiously optimistic that circumstances may allow for her to gather with family and friends to celebrate.

She is planning for it, because there are few things she loves more than a Christmas party. She's already purchased Christmas presents.

"I started shopping in June," she says.

But Terry Ann's anticipation for the holiday season is rooted in more than just seasonal cheer and Christmas spirit.

No, it is far more personal for her: because she lost the last two Christmases. In 2020, it was due to the pandemic. In 2019, it was because she was in a coma, fighting for her life.

Terry lives in Portsmouth, NH, at Betty's Dream, a nonprofit residential program for adults with disabilities to live

independently. She moved to Portsmouth in 2006 from Manchester, following the advice of her doctor to begin looking for wheelchair accessible housing.

This would prove to be prescient.

Her entire life changed in 2009 when she endured a devastating medical event connected to her Crohn's disease. She spent two weeks in the hospital and another two weeks in rehab. But the damage had been done; her strength had vanished and she became a full-time wheelchair user.

Starting 2011, Terry Ann became a client of Crotched Mountain Community Care (CMCC), Crotched Mountain Foundation's independent case management program that supports adults with disabilities, chronic medical conditions, and unique needs.

"To assist Terry Ann with living independently in the community, CMCC has worked hard to meet her durable medical equipment and staffing needs

for personal care services," says Becky, Terry's CMCC Case Manager. "Terry Ann is a pleasure to work with because she is always trying to find new ways to show her appreciation for services and assistance."

This support would become critical over the last two years, especially in 2019, when, while preparing for a large Christmas party,

Terry Ann was besieged by kidney failure. She ended up in a coma for five days and remembered nothing after the moment she was picked up by the ambulance.

"I thought I had gotten into a car accident," she says. "I didn't know what happened. When I called my mother after I woke up, she told me that she never thought she was going to hear my voice again. The doctors didn't expect me to live."



Terry Ann loves her home, her community, and her independence. And thanks to the support of Crotched Mountain Community Care, the generosity of donors like you, and her tireless self advocacy, she has all three.

Thankfully, Terry Ann rebounded and returned to her home - all the while thinking: *I don't want to go to a nursing home*. She knew she was too young and had too much independent life to live still.

And that's what Becky and her CMCC colleagues work to do: give their clients the help they need to remain in their community and out of nursing homes.

Recently, there was a perfect example of this. For nearly two years, Becky and Terry Ann worked tirelessly to get funding approval for a "sit to stand" lift so she can safely transfer (move out from her wheelchair to access different areas in her house).

After surmounting numerous insurance challenges, CMCC was able to secure \$7,500 for the lift, as well as an elevator lift for her power wheelchair. Which leaves one more thing to do: start planning the Christmas party!

"CMCC stands above all other service providers because we try very hard to secure resources for our clients that they might otherwise have to do without," said Kara Nickulas, Director of Programs for Crotched Mountain. "For clients like Terry Ann, such resources can make all the difference for independence and quality of life."

"I came so close to death," Terry Ann says.
"I'm trying to live my life to the fullest, trying to take advantage of anything and everything."

Nearly four decades ago, as a young lawyer in a Manchester NH firm, Ben Gayman was not surprised to learn that philanthropy was ingrained throughout the practice, and that many of his peers were tirelessly involved in worthy non-profits. Before long, Ben and his wife Carol were also helping local charities.

It was the 1980s and Ben and Carol were quickly drawn to Crotched Mountain Foundation's renowned reputation for serving the needs of adults and children with the most complex disabilities throughout the region.
