The six recipient school districts come from Coos and Grafton counties and include Berlin, Milan, Littleton, Lisbon, White Mountain, and Northumberland Stratford and Stark. The awards are all designed to strengthen the social, emotional, and educational outcomes of children with complex disabilities.


Welcome New Trustees!

Groveton's Summer Reading List

Groveton Elementary School and CMF Kids are joining forces to change the trajectory of the lives of students with disabilities - and maybe, just maybe, an entire town's future. All thanks to *you*!

Groveton, NH. For many people it is a place to pass through on their way to the top of the state. Remote and quite rural, Groveton was once well known for its booming paper manufacturing mills and all that the mills offered this small town. Now a tender memory for many, "This is the town that was devastated when that mill closed down."

But for the staff and teachers of SAU 58 and the Northumberland School District contained therein, Groveton is not merely a footnote in the memoir of the North Country. It is a place where all children no matter their circumstance or diagnosis can chart a path to a bright future.

"At our SAU, we try to make it feel like a familyrich environment," says Michelle Mason, Student Services Administrator. "Here, we can rely on one another and support one another."

Which is important, because the needs at Groveton Elementary School are significant. Over 25% of the student population (according to the NH DOE I-report for 2021) of the K-5 school are considered special education students, who are diagnosed with a variety of disabilities including autism, developmental delay, hearing impairment, and learning disabilities.

Of that percent 50% are economically disadvantaged (according to the NH DOE I-report for 2021). The Language proficiency number is even more staggering: of the entire special education population, 75% are not proficient in English and Language Arts (i.e., reading). In Math?

Only 17% are proficient.

"We know that our special education population under-performs substantially," Michelle says.

What to do? Teachers had clamored for the Orton-Gillingham curriculum, which provides a multi-sensory, phonetics reading program for both the special education and general education student populations. But the resources were just not there to fund the curriculum.

This opportunity proved to be a perfect fit for Crotched Mountain Foundation and CMF Kids, and, working with the school district, the Orton-Gillingham curriculum was purchased and teachers were trained in June 2022. This is the type of resource that can change the course of children's lives, and it is thanks to you, the dedicated supporters of CMF Kid and Crotched Mountain, that this school will be so positively impacted.

And the Orton-Gillingham curriculum will make an enormous impact. Because, as Michelle, notes that so much academic achievement emanates from reading prowess, and students who are lacking language arts capability have an uphill climb towards school success

"Reading hits every content area," she says. "It is crucial for functioning in life. My mindset was, if we target reading

first, then we're helping science, social studies, and real-life math."

She continues: "The best years in developing reading are in kindergarten to second grade. With Orton-Gillingham, we really wanted to target those foundational grades."

Michelle sees the introduction of the curriculum having a ripple effect throughout the school district, from elementary school to high school. In fact, the reverberations will likely travel through the entire North Country, as several out-of-district teachers will attend the training. Beyond the classroom, Michelle is confident the improved reading skills will have a major positive impact in the home as well.

"When parents feel like their children are making academic progress, they're pleased, they're happy, she says. "It helps connect family and school. School is stressful for many special education students. That means even the smallest gains are the biggest success stories."

And that's the goal of CMF Kids: to make an investment that will make a difference in the lives of children with disabilities - and their families - for years to come.

Your generosity is responsible for this, and it is not lost on those who see the results first-hand.

"We have scarce resources up here," Michelle says. "We don't have a lot of the programming and trainings available to us in the North Country. A gift like this not only enhances the quality of our children's lives and their future, but it impacts our entire town. We hope the children that are homegrown here want to stay here. The next kindergartner, in 20 years, might start a new business in the old mill property."



Your Generosity at Work! CMF Kids Unveils New North Country Special Education Awards

Nearly \$1 million invested in local school districts from under-resourced communities to support children with complex disabilities

Crotched Mountain Foundation is pleased to announce the largest round of partnership awards through its CMF Kids program. CMF Kids collaborates with under-resourced New Hampshire school districts to support and strengthen special education for kids with the most complex disabilities. With this new round of awards, Crotched Mountain will have dedicated more than \$1 million since 2021.

The six recipient school districts come from Coos and Grafton counties and include Berlin, Milan, Littleton, Lisbon, White Mountain, and Northumberland Stratford and Stark. The awards will fund initiatives over three years, all designed to strengthen the social, emotional, and educational outcomes of children with complex disabilities.

"As we have for nearly 100 years, Crotched Mountain Foundation is committed to serving the most vulnerable children in New Hampshire," said Ned Olney, President and CEO of Crotched Mountain Foundation. "With CMF Kids, we're able to serve the hardest to reach children in some of the poorest communities. Working closely with our school partners, and supported by our donors, Crotched Mountain is proud to help children with disabilities from the North Country succeed in their schools and their communities."

The CMF Kids investments will support the following initiatives: specialized curriculum training for general and special education teachers, expansion of a life-skills-vocational training program, paraprofessional training leading to credentialed certification as behavior technicians, the building of more inclusive special education programs that promote cultures of acceptance and competence, and wrap-around support services to include; case management, tutoring, and rehabilitative supports. Special education equipment, technology and infrastructure support is also provided to schools.

From the Ashes

How does someone rebound when she's lost everything? She relies on her friends and allies - and life-changing donors like you.

It was Saturday last November when Marge Goodreault received news that caught the breath in her lungs. The local news had reported an apartment fire in Manchester, NH, an inferno that consumed the entire building and had, tragically, claimed a life.

Marge, a case manager for Crotched Mountain Community Care (CMCC), felt a surge of panic because she recognized the address of the building; it was where her client Susan lived. Eventually, after many phone calls, Marge located Susan, who had been put up in emergency shelter through the Red Cross.

Susan had just barely escaped the fire, jolted by the smoke alarm, and running out with no shoes or jacket, just her nightgown and phone representing the last of her world possessions (she,sadly, lost her pets in the blaze).

As a CMCC client, Susan receives medical and personal care services to help her remain in her home and out of nursing care placement. She is in her 70s, suffers from chronic illness and has mobility challenges, which made her bounce-back from the building fire all the more imposing.

"After the initial shock, we tried to return Susan to as much normalcy as possible," Marge says. "That meant rerouting her services and personal items to her hotel and getting equipment like a walker and shower chair so she could move around her place safely."

Once these pieces fell into place the heavy lifting of finding a new apartment settled in. The collaboration among Susan's case workers from CMCC, Manchester Mental Health, and Catholic Medical Center, brought many "almosts" and near-successes (the affordable housing market in New Hampshire is vanishingly small). Eventually, a new apartment was located and Susan moved into it in February.

Through CMCC grant funding, Susan was able to outfit her new home with a kitchen table, chairs, bureaus, and a microwave cart.

"She persevered," Marge said. "There was lots of collaboration and many phone calls to housing providers and emails to the other social workers. We all played a part and now she's good to go. She even has two new cats."

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Brewing Up Some Good Times with CMF Kids!

This past school year, at Berlin Middle—High School, the popular coffee cart café reached new heights with its vocational training program for students with disabilities. Berlin Middle-High School is a CMF Kids partner, and used the CMF Kids partnership award to support the coffee cafe, which provides real-world retail experience for students in its special education program.

The school's Coffee Cart Café emulates the inspirational business model of Bitty's and Beau's Coffee, a nationwide cafe that provides employment opportunities to people living with intellectual and developmental disabilities. As part of the CMF Kids partnership award, Berlin students were able to take a field trip to Bitty and Beau's in Boston.

"We felt this was a wonderful way to connect their experiential learning to the real-world and to meet other people with disabilities who are working at Bitty and Beau's," said Melissa White, Executive Director of CMF Kids. "It would help to dispel stereotypical attitudes, create more inclusive workplaces, and demonstrate gainful employment opportunities for people with disabilities."
