## Jill Collier's Legacy Lives On

Tuesday, June 17, 2014.

The voice on the phone: "Hi! This is Jill Collier. Almost 40 years ago, Crotched Mountain helped train me as a young special education teacher."

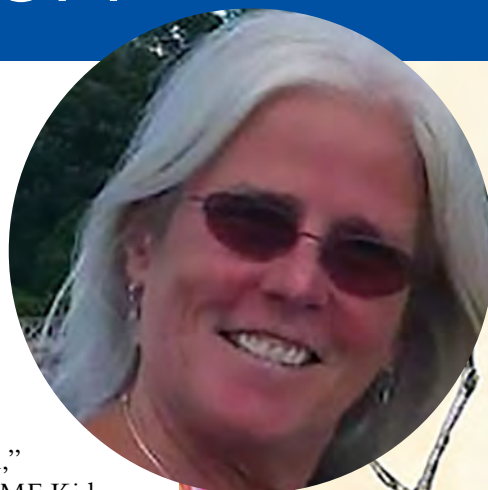
Jill phoned to share how that training had inspired her 38-year career teaching hundreds, if not thousands, of children with disabilities. She was already planning to help provide special education training for generations to come.

Less than 15 months later, Jill lost her life in a tragic accident. But Jill had already sown the seeds of her enduring legacy. A distribution from Jill's estate created the Jill Collier Memorial Fund. Since then, Jill's

partner, Andy Card, has helped steward additional contributions from friends, family and others.

"As an endowed fund, it generates income and growth," Andy says. "Now, through CMF Kids, Jill's legacy helping special education teachers and paraprofessionals in our poorest communities—providing training that inspires teachers for their own decades of service." ■

# ADAPTIVE PLAY MAKES JOY ACCESSIBLE FOR ALL AT GOSSLER PARK

It was a ribbon cutting to remember! Last month saw the grand opening of a brand new accessible and inclusive playground at Gossler Park School in Manchester, made possible through our CMF Kids program and you, our generous donors.

Through this groundbreaking partnership, Gossler Park secured adaptive equipment and classroom resources for students with multiple disabilities and resurfaced the playground area with a rubberized surface, ideal for students who use wheelchairs.

“This project has truly opened doors for our students,” said Principal Lori Upham. “To see our children laughing, playing, and sharing those joyful moments together on the playground is absolutely heartwarming. It’s more than just a playground, it’s inclusion in action.”

“Crotched Mountain Foundation and CMF Kids believe the joy of play is for all children of all abilities,” said

Melissa White, Executive Director of CMF Kids. “We are honored to partner with Manchester School District to make inclusive play a reality for the Gossler Park community.”

The Gossler Park construction is the latest addition to a growing portfolio of CMF Kids adaptive playground projects. A similar effort was made possible at Bakersville Elementary School, another example of collaboration between Manchester School District and Crotched Mountain Foundation/CMF Kids.

“This work reflects what’s possible when schools and community partners come together,” said Superintendent Jennifer Chmiel. “Gossler Park’s new playground will provide a welcoming space where all children, regardless of ability, can play, learn, and grow together.” ■

# COMMUNITY IS

## The Residents of McIntyre School Apartments are All About Going Out and About

Whitefield, NH. It may not be known for its legendary night life, but that doesn't mean there isn't adventure to be had. Just ask the crew at McIntyre School Apartments (MSA), Crotched Mountain Foundation's affordable housing complex for adults 62 and over. As a HUD-supported program, MSA provides safe, stable residential living for some of New Hampshire's most vulnerable residents.

But, as we all know, there's more to life than just, well, living. Getting out and adventuring, spending time with others, and enjoying the benefits of

community—these are the joys that can be challenging to obtain as a senior (perhaps with a disability) living alone.

The MCA staff is keenly aware of these barriers and the importance of leisure and recreation. Beth Vincent, who has been the long-time case manager in Whitefield supporting the needs of the residents, understands the power of community.

“Whitefield is a low-Income area, so there are not a lot of resources around us,” she says. “For folks who probably have enough stresses in their lives, whether finances or health, isolation can negatively affect them.”

To combat that isolation, the tenants formed the Resident Activity Committee, where they would work together to create outings and events for their neighbors to take part in. Momentum was going strong until the pandemic hit, waylaying the committee and, sadly, leading to increased “stop-the-spread” isolation. The Committee was suspended, until it returned recently to generate a whole new slate of opportunities.

So far it's been a steady stream of outings: an excursion to an apple orchard, a foliage field trip and a picnic lunch, a visit to a nearby state park, and an afternoon at the famous Flume gorge followed by ice cream.


The fun isn't limited to the outdoors either. The tenants take pride in making MSA a nexus of socialization for the greater Whitefield community. Case in point: the

annual Halloween party, a spine-tingling bash hosted by the tenants at the MSA community room (the old auditorium during the building's life as an elementary school). Families and their children are invited to come by for an afternoon of trick or treating. The 2025 edition was another homerun.

“It was fantastic,” Beth says. “Initially, at 4:00, we had maybe seven kids and I was really surprised. I was, like, ‘Wow, I really miscalculated this,’ because it was so popular last year. But then they just all poured in for the rest of the hour and a half. We had around 300 people show up!”

And though costumes were everywhere, for the tenants of MSA, there was no masking their smiles. ■

# RAMPING UP IMPACT



Kim is a client of Crotched Mountain Community Care (CMCC), Crotched Mountain's independent case management program for adults on the CFI Medicaid waiver. This waiver services folks who are at risk of entering a nursing home, many of whom have a disability or chronic condition. Kim uses a wheelchair and has been without a ramp at her house for some time, severely limiting her opportunity to get out of her house and live a life of maximum independence.

Working closely with her CMCC case manager, Dawn, Kim was finally able to get a ramp installed using CFI funds. To say she was grateful is an understatement. She was so appreciative she wished to share her feelings in her own words, which you can read below

*Crotched Mountain Foundation has been instrumental in making my life so much easier and more enjoyable.*

*First of all, I've been assigned an amazing case manager, Dawn Facella. As an amputee, my challenge was definitely there when my son bought the house that we currently live in. Prior to CMCC, I was having to go up-and-down the stairs without a ramp, which, as a wheelchair patient, is incredibly challenging.*

*Dawn has gone out of her way to make a couple of things happen, including getting a ramp for the outside of my house. This has made attending my appointments a lot more accessible. She also made it possible for my bathroom to become accessible. She also helped me get into a physical therapy program.*

*She continues to help me every time that she's here, including getting new mobility additions to my wheelchair through the program.*

*I honestly can't say enough good things and I hope that this makes people realize that this program is an amazing addition to our community.*
